"Plant America, While Keeping PA Beautiful" will be the GCFP theme for 2023-2025. All clubs are encouraged to include litter and recycling projects in their planned activities. Work along with students by supporting projects of environmental clubs, scout troops and Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful affiliates in your districts. Clean places have more economic value and people living in clean places are healthier.



In our state, the organization Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful, works along with the PA Department of Environmental Protection and PA Department of Transportation to provide litter collection in spring and fall. Check out the "Litter Hawk" program for youth K-6th grade. "PA Fights Dirty" (every litter bit) is a new program aimed at ridding us of litter. Did you know that 80% of litter is four inches in size or less, and 40% of that consists of tossed cigarette butts?

Recycle whenever possible; know what can be recycled in your area, since rules are different all across Pennsylvania. Plastic shopping bags, soda and cat food aluminum cans and other items are collected and re-used to create new products, saving our precious resources. Compost food waste if you can, putting less in landfills and making black gold for your plantings! Our friends at the Pennsylvania Resources Council (PRC) and other organizations conduct events to recycle hard to dispose of items in many counties. My hope is that clubs will investigate what's going on near you and spread the word that these opportunities exist.

We have a lot to do in two years. I'm grateful for the opportunity to serve the GCFP in this effort.

- Eleven Uwchlan club members served in Major and/or Presenter positions of the 2022 GCFP Convention in Malvern.

- Multiple civic, conservation, educational, youth gardening, horticulture therapy, and fundraising activities supported and improved their community.
- The combined fundraising efforts of their Plant Sale and Christmas Fair raised \$19,000 to support their projects and philanthropies.

Abbey Nilson Environmentalist Teacher

By the time she was four, Abbey Nilson was by her mother's side working in the garden, composting, and helping with the Shaler Garden Club's annual plant sales. Her mother, Shelley Nilson, an accomplished master gardener and educator for the Audubon Society of Western PA, and a 36-year member of the Shaler Garden Club, nurtured and taught her daughter well. Abbey has become an educator whose goal is to instill the love of land and our precious resources in the next generation.

Abbey initiated the Sustainability Class at Shaler Area High School in 2020. The curriculum is designed to encourage students to examine the impact of their own water and energy use, transportation and food choices, as well as trash recycling and waste disposal. This program encourages students to work with community leaders on environmentally themed community projects.

Abbey motivated her students to work with the Allegheny Land Trust over the past two years to raise awareness, help purchase, and preserve a 155 acre tract of land known as Girty's Woods, named for the watershed in which it is located. It was being targeted for development without regard for its critical role in storm water absorption and flood prevention for the borough situated in the basin below. Allegheny Land Trust was able to purchase the land and preserve it as a greenspace in 2021. Her students have continued to partner with ALT to assist with fundraising efforts for the Shaler/Reserve Land Protection Project to further and safeguard stormwater absorption, preserve the natural beauty of a former 60 acre tract of farmland, expand natural habitats, and increase native wildlife and native plants.

Abbey has created an awareness in the community about the importance of greenspace preservation. Her students turned their classroom into a "nursery" for 300 native tree seedlings that they later planted. They are working on an ongoing Native Species Project identifying and documenting the native plant species in Girty's Woods. With the help of the Audubon Society, they have created a special mix of native seed packets important for pollinators as part of their "Save the Land, Save the Monarchs" campaign. They raised a monarch butterfly from an egg in class, then tagged it for release and research.

To create an awareness of the environmental impact of single use plastics, her students proposed building an ecobrick planter made of used plastic bottles on the school grounds. To help fund the green restoration of a damaged community building, her students grew succulents from cuttings, potted, and sold them. The restoration included solar panels, an electric vehicle charging station, and a playground with "green" features.

In addition to developing an awareness of the importance of preserving our natural resources, Abbey's students are developing organizational, communication, and co-operative skills. She serves on the Millvale Community Development Corporation Board and the Triboro Ecodistrict Council. She was named a semifinalist for the 2023 Pennsylvania Teacher of the Year. The positive impact of Abbey's lessons on her students and community is far-reaching and lasting.

Abbey's Sustainability students at Shaler Area High School have written a children's book, "Love the Earth", a collection of short stories, poems, artwork, activities, and positive messages to help raise funds for the future Etna Library. "Protecting Our Water Resources" In her own words

Water is the most important resource on our planet. People consume millions of gallons of water every day. The way humans are currently using water is not sustainable. Water is being used more than it can be produced. Overpopulation is a huge problem in the world. The earth is struggling to keep up. When I hear about protecting our water resources, the first thing I think about is simple things like turning off water to brush my teeth and taking shorter showers. Throughout my research, I have found that this problem goes way deeper than just these simple fixes. Chemicals are not being disposed of properly, the carelessness of farming, and overpopulation are some examples of the bigger problem.

Large companies have been dumping chemicals into our water resources for decades. Arsenic (As), Mercury (Hg), Selenium (Se), and Lead (Pb) are only a few examples of poisons that are being put in our water. These chemicals live in our environment, ruining our earth for decades. Not only do they harm us but also harm our animals living in these poisonous waters. The concentration of chemicals is known for promoting the growth of algae blooms, which are both harmful to humans and toxic to wildlife by making the water smoggy, suffocating the coral, and much more. I believe that holding these companies accountable for the years of damage is the first step in prevention.

Furthermore, businesses like farming also have responsibility in this grave issue. Pesticides are being sprayed onto our crops. Then when those crops are watered, the toxins run off into our environment, leaching nitrogen into groundwater. If you happen to be in downtown Troy, PA on a summer day, you might see one of the members of the Heritage Garden Club watering one of the seventeen pole baskets and the ten pedestal planters the club maintains. It is common for these busy women to hear passersby say, "You ladies do



such a nice job of beautifying Troy," or someone in a car tapping their horn in approval as they drive by.

As summer fades into September, it is time to cut back the flowers that have been so carefully tended and to fill the containers with a variety of fall themed faux flowers, greenery and cute little scarecrows. With the surrounding mountains all

ablaze as a backdrop, it is visually stunning.

Once Thanksgiving has come and gone it is time to

remove the fall decorations and gather up fresh greenery from the members' yards to prepare for the winter display. Each planter contains a variety of pine boughs, holly, spruce, hemlock, twigs,

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PARLIAMENTARY POINTERS

Sharon Brown, GCFP Parliamentarian

Probably the question that has come before me most often since taking this position has been one of Quorum. What is a quorum and why is it necessary? Simply put a quorum is the minimum number of members that must be present to conduct business in an organized assembly such as your club or district meeting. It is necessary to protect against an action by a small number of persons that is not truly representative of your organization's purpose or goals. The quorum may be stated as a number or percentage in your by-laws and should be a realistic representation of the average attendance. If your meeting is regularly scheduled and members know the usual time and place, the quorum required is whomever attends.

Another parliamentary topic that has come up several times is the way in which chairpersons address the assembly. Members presenting a report should address only the Presiding Officer, that would be your club president, your district director, or the state president. I hear complaints all the time about a chair who wants to be sure everyone is listening, so they open their report with an address to the presiding officer... and members, and guests and all my friends! When the state president and vice presidents attend the district meetings, they do so as special guests of the assembly and should not be addressed when a report is given. Most often, an introductory welcome has already been given by the presiding officer to all special guests.

Lastly, and this is one that really stumps me, no one seems to want to make a motion. A motion is simply a proposal that the assembly take a certain action. "I move that..." and finish with your proposal. Be specific, use time and/or place if necessary, and dollar figures when appropriate. Saying "so moved" after someone else makes the suggestion is not correct, nor is "I make a motion" correct language. If members do not take the initiative to actually speak the words, then the recording secretary must come up with the motion. This is not good parliamentary procedure.

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HOW DOES YOUR CLUB TREAT YOUR SPEAKERS?

Susanna Reppert Brill, Member Penn-Cumberland GC, Program Resource for District IV, GCFP Program Resource

There are many things that a club can do to ensure good experiences and a quality programs for your club meeting. The following listed items can be done to have a good program for your meeting. Please keep score and give your club one point for each item done consistently.

Do you give your speaker solid information for date/ time and location of the program? Simply saying we meet at the Methodist Church is not enough. In my little town there are eight, yes eight, Methodist churches and each has multiple doors to enter. Be sure to give a complete name of your meeting location, full address, correct date and time AND include a tip as to which entrance to use. Also give your speaker a cell phone number to contact a member at the meeting as necessary. All of this is critically important information.

Do you reach out for a final contact a day or two before the program just to reconfirm all of the critical information such as date/ time/ location/ entrance and cell phone contact?

Do you ask in advance what the speaker needs to have a successful program for your club? Do they need audio visual equipment, a card table or an eight-foot table, a microphone and/or a podium? And is that organized in advance?

Do you have a greeter or someone to watch for and welcome the speaker when they arrive?

Do you have someone available to help carry in items, pass around papers as needed, help make sure the AV equipment is ready, and see if your speaker needs a glass of water?

Do you promote their program to your members in advance of the meeting to build excitement?

Did you promote their program on your FB page or to the newspaper? It is especially important to offer promotion for speakers that do not receive an honorarium. Do you have their speaker fee/honorarium check prepared and ready to give to them the day of the program?

Do you ask the speaker in advance for some introductory materials and also very importantly how to pronounce their name so you are prepared before the start of the program?

Do you invite them to stay for the refreshments? Do you send a thank you note or thank you email afterwards? And, for a bonus point, did you include a tidbit from their program you found particularly intriguing?

Did you score a solid 10 points? Yay! Great job! Did you score 8 or 9 points? That is still very good and I am proud of you. Did you score a 6 or 7? Oh my! You need to up your game a bit!

LEAF COLORS

Each fall leaf peepers emerge to feast their eyes on the glory of the leaves of deciduous trees across Penn's Woods. Bright sunlight filtering through golden, tangerine, and scarlet leaves can leave you spellbound in wonder at the beautiful

sight. While driving home from Philadelphia this past Sunday, I was treated to such a vision that was so uplifting it filled me with gratitude for all of nature and I felt entirely holy.

How does mother nature put on such a show? The surprising thing about these colors is that they are there in the leaves the whole time but are covered up or masked by the overwhelming amount of green chlorophyll in the leaves. Yellow and orange carotenoids are in the leaves to help them absorb wavelengths of the sun in a broader spectrum. The green chlorophyll is the miracle chemical that produces sugar in the plant. Reds are produced when anthocyanins use sugar backed up in the leaves in fall.

In early autumn, in response to the shortening days and declining intensity of sunlight, leaves form an abscission layer at the base of the petioles which virtually close it off. This causes chlorophyll production to slow and eventually stop as there is less daylight. The carotenoids and anthocyanin that are present in the leaf are then unmasked and show their colors.

The amount and brilliance of the colors that develop in any particular autumn season are most closely related to temperature and moisture. A succession of warm, sunny days and cool, crisp but not freezing nights seems to bring about the most spectacular color displays. It is one of the greatest shows on earth.


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JUST SOMETHING ABOUT MAPS

Do you have a garden full of flowering plants? Do you love to watch bees, butterflies and hummingbirds as they move from plant to plant in your garden? Then, put your garden on the map! There are two maps that deserve your attention. Both show a commitment to conserving pollinator habitats.

Pennsylvania Pollinator Friendly Garden Map. To be on the Pennsylvania Pollinator Friendly Garden (PPFG) map, your property must be certified as pollinator friendly. The PPFG certification program, which started in 2011, provides guidelines for creating a safe haven for pollinators along with native plant recommendations for Pennsylvania. Certification requires that you abide by best pollinator practices and provide documentation that your property has an established pollinator garden as defined by the program. Satisfying the requirements to have your garden certified takes some time and effort, but it is well worth it. Over 1,000 homeowners across our state have done it.

Once a garden is PPFG certified, it is tracked on the PPFG map. More information can be found on the PA Pollinator Garden Certification website at https://ento.psu.edu/research/centers/pollinators/public-outreach/cert.

Homegrown National Park MAP. Homegrown National Park (HNP) is a new approach to unite fragments of land scattered across the country into a network of natural habitats. Organized in 2020 by Doug Tallamy, with assistance from Michelle Alfandari, HNP encourages anyone with a flowerpot, lawn, garden, or farm to plant and preserve plants and animals that are essential to the health of our ecosystems. Though still in its initial stages of development, this initiative is strong and gaining attention and momentum across the US and Canada. No doubt, success can be attributed to the keen, insightful leadership of Doug Tallamy, a renowned expert in the science of plant-insect interactions who is passionate about helping people create wildlife habitats in their own backyards and gardens.

The HNP initiative encourages anyone who plants natives and/or removes invasives from their property to get on their MAP and report their accomplishments. Though there are no requirements specific to the number of plants on your property, the HNP initiative emphases a commitment to environmentally-friendly its practices, which are aligned with but actually exceed those outlined in the PPFG program. The initial HNP goal is to develop 20 million acres of native plantings across the United States. The MAP offers a robust, interactive format for logging your native plantings and for gathering information across local, regional and national contributors. To date, over 27,000 individuals have registered to be on the MAP. Pennsylvania ranks 8th in HNP registrations with over 1,200.

It is clear that home and community gardens can play a key role in the survival of our ecosystems and that people across Pennsylvania are making a difference. With over 4,700 members, wouldn't it be great if a substantial number of our GCFP membership got on the maps? What an impact we could have! I am on both maps. Are you?

Here is a quote from a BBC article on how the majestic gardens in Europe survive: "It's all about people - not just to do the work, but people to care and be engaged. Gardens are driven by individuals who feel the need to express themselves through the medium of a garden." That describes me.

An 88-year-old good friend of mine suggested that we find another hobby for me "to get me off the ground." She was an avid gardener who took many classes at the NY Botanical Garden. I wrote this to her when she was wintering in Florida:

"I am responding to your comment that I should find another hobby that does not require sitting on the ground. I am passionate about gardening. I watch a Garden Answer post every day and I can't wait to get to the park. Every single time I am in the garden, I am thanked and complimented or I have a delightful conversation. I get exercise and fresh air. I learn continually. I watch many different flowers, bushes and trees grow and bloom.

I experienced "good press" this last year with a TV interview and two federation awards. This month, I was quoted in the federation newsletter: "I know that I inspire people as five different people told me that I inspire them. After a group of nine people spread mulch, the very next morning a volunteer was spreading mulch at his home. A neighbor watched what I cut back in the fall and did the same. Then her daughter copied the practices." I influence and inspire others. I teach everyone including children.

We are a way station for Monarch butterflies. I attract Insects, bees, birds and butterflies. The park improves the quality of the neighborhood and the environment. I encourage adults and children to work the garden increasing their sense of ownership. I want to garden into my 90s. I bought a new stool to use in the garden that will get me off the ground. I found my life's purpose. I wanted you to know this."
