GCFP AWARDS REPORT

The 2021 Awards year culminated with the presentation of 183 awards certificates to individuals, clubs, and districts at our GCFP 2022 Convention. Certificates were distributed to their respective District Directors to be presented to their awarded clubs after each meal's awards presentation. A detailed listing of all GCFP Award Winners was published in the May issue of the Keystone Gardener Online.

Updates to our supporting documents are being prepared with a projected 7/1/2022 posting date. The Awards Manual, Awards Summary, Awards Deadline Dates, and Awards Application/Cover Sheet documents are being updated or amended. Formatting Guidelines are also being prepared. DO NOT SUBMIT ANY GCFP APPLICATIONS PRIOR TO 7/1/2022. We are planning a Zoom Awards seminar in mid-July to highlight the awards process and answer questions. These additional changes should be noted:

The revamped NGC Awards Program last summer required many adjustments. Mastering electronic submissions of applications was challenging for most. Resubmissions were allowed to correct mistakes. This awards season, it is strongly recommended that awards applications be sent to another club member to review for needed corrections before the application is forwarded to the Awards Chair. What is received is what will be judged; resubmissions will not be accepted.

Our 4 GCFP Club Size Categories have been adjusted to align with the 3 NGC Club Size Breakdowns. The breakdown is as follows: S=Clubs with 1-20 Members, M=Clubs with 21-50 Members, L=Clubs with 51+ Members. (Using Spring 2022 Membership Totals, we have 13 Small Clubs, 64 Medium Clubs, and 29 Large Clubs.) CAR-SGC Club Size Breakdowns align very closely with the NGC guidelines.



The Executive Board voted to make the Forget-Me-Not Award, a District Award, to be presented at each District's Annual Meeting. Each District's honoree will be acknowledged with a picture and summary of their accomplishments in

the KG Online. More information will be forwarded to our District Directors.

The Cynthia Calhoun Convention Attendance Award has been eliminated.

The Perennial Bloom Award is the first award deadline of the 2022 Awards Year. July 1st is the deadline for clubs to submit their Perennial Bloom applications to their District Directors. The CAR-SGC Perennial Bloom Award 2021-2023 information and application form is available on our Awards site. (The tab is green.) August 1st is the deadline for District Directors to forward their District Perennial Bloom Honoree to the GCFP Awards Chair. The GCFP Perennial Bloom Honoree will be announced at our Annual Meeting this fall.

As you plan your submissions for the 2022 Awards Year, be sure to check for updates on the Awards Page of our GCFP Website, follow the instructions given, and remember that you have to apply to win!

BEE GAP

This has been a fun year for me as the Bee Gap Chairman. I gave several programs on our Native Bees to garden clubs and at the Erie Home, and at the Garden Expo for the Master Gardeners. I am still surprised how little the general public knows about our Native Bees, including our Mason Bee.

At one of the garden clubs, my program was a two-part series. The first part was the information regarding these bees. It included some history, pictures, habitat, how to keep and attract bees and then what to do with the houses later in the summer.



For the second part, I brought houses/hotels, reeds, my DIY bee houses, mud making ideas - everything but the bees. These programs were done in April and May because this time the Masons are starting to hatch and members could make or buy their houses to see what happens.

I also bought some Mason Bee cocoons and placed them outside when the temperature was correct. I securely taped them on top of one of my store-bought houses. It took about 2 weeks for the males to start to emerge. (They have a white spot on their

face.) I was so excited!!! I took videos and pictures. A few days later the females then emerged.

Now, this house was totally empty when I hung it outside. I eagerly watched for any activity. The next day I had females coming and going all day long. I was standing right in front of it and they just ignored me and went about their business. At first one hole was completely mudded over. Now I have 11 mudded holes. Whoo-Hoo.



Most of the Masons probably now have finished their life cycle, but there may be some late hatchers that might be around. I am keeping the bee house up, because the leaf cutter bees will grow from larvae to bee and start their process in the near future. The leafcutter bee is not native, but very common and uses the same house/hotel as the Mason Bee. It is still considered a good pollinator.

Last year I did have a few grass carrying wasps, which are native, and a pollinator, in my bee house. I don't think it survived because I didn't know why all this grass was hanging out in some of the holes and I poked at it and I may have destroyed the egg.

I went out the other day to check for any further activity in the house. Nothing new other than the 12 completed nests. But I did not expect to see in my DIY little branch that I drilled holes into, leafcutter bee nests. I did a happy dance outside. I think my neighbors will be sending me to a rest home soon.
